*Joint Statement on Friendly Cooperation and Exchange
between
the State of Queensland, Australia
and
the Shanghai Municipal Government, The People's Republic of China*

On 24 May 1989, the State of Queensland and the City of Shanghai (hereinafter referred to as 'the Parties') signed a landmark Memorandum of Agreed Cooperation. That Memorandum and its successors have promoted fruitful cooperation in the commercial, education, science and technology, cultural and government sectors between the Parties.


2014 marks the 25th anniversary of the sister state-city relationship between Queensland and Shanghai. Both Parties are looking forward to furthering the friendly relationship and working together in the following key areas.

- i. Shanghai is compiling a master plan for a new round of urban development, according to which, it strives to become a global city with international competitiveness, influence and capacity of allocating global resources. Queensland is also developing its *Queensland Plan*, which puts forward the concept of vigorous, green, smart, healthy and equitable development. The Parties will explore various ways to jointly discuss and identify solutions to common issues in urban development and tackle challenges brought about by globalisation, so as to realise their goals set forth for development.
- ii. Shanghai is now stepping up the development of the China (Shanghai) Pilot Free Trade Zone, while Queensland is committed to building itself into the most dynamic and strongest diverse economy in Australia. The Parties will strengthen information sharing and encourage their businesses to take an active part in each other's economic development.
- iii. The Parties will expand and deepen cooperation and exchange in areas with a solid foundation, such as public administration, science and technology, as well as education. Both Parties will also explore new opportunities of cooperation in business, healthcare, agriculture, tourism, architecture and people to people exchange.
- iv. The Parties will fully leverage the 25th anniversary of the sister state-city relationship and push forward, on the basis of mutual consultation and agreement, the friendly cooperation and exchange by organising a series of celebrations subject to budget and resource availability.

This Joint Statement is signed in Brisbane, Queensland, Australia on 2nd June 2014 in both the English and Chinese languages.



PURPOSE

- The purpose of this submission is to seek your:
 - approval of the updated Queensland-Shanghai Memorandum of Agreed Cooperation for its 10th iteration for 2014-2016 (refer Attachment 1).

BACKGROUND

- The Queensland-Shanghai Sister State relationship was established in 1989 and is expressed in a Memorandum of Agreed Cooperation (MoU) first signed by the former Premier the Hon Mike Ahern.
- Queensland is the only Australian State with a Sister State relationship with the Shanghai Municipal Government. The relationship is reaffirmed every two years with a renewed version of the MoU, following a review and renewal process by both the Queensland and Shanghai Municipal Governments.
- The current ninth iteration of the Queensland-Shanghai MoU covers the period 2011-2013. It was jointly signed by the former Treasurer and Trade Minister, the Hon Andrew Fraser and HE Tang Dengjie, Vice Mayor, Shanghai Municipal Government on 21 June 2010 in Shanghai. A copy is provided at Attachment 2.
- The main areas of cooperation between Queensland and Shanghai are focused on sustainable economic development, including trade and investment; education; tourism; science and technology; police; health; culture and sports. A number of successful exchange programs have been held during the life of the current MoU, including a Business Executive Training program (whereby a Queensland company hosts two rising Chinese executives from a complementary sector and provides a customised training program for an eight week period); Public Servant Exchange and Police training programs and exchanges. Other joint activities include educational exchanges involving students and teachers, English and Mandarin language speaking competitions and collaborative research programs between research institutes in Queensland and Shanghai. Outcomes of the current MoU are provided at Attachment 3.
- Trade and Investment Queensland (TIQ) is responsible for the management and renewal of the Queensland-Shanghai MoU. TIQ undertook a comprehensive consultation process with 28 Queensland Government agencies and organisations to obtain reports on collaborative activities undertaken under the current MoU, proposals for joint activities for the next iteration of the MoU and amendments to the MoU document itself. A Queensland stakeholder consultation list is provided at Attachment 4 and a consolidated stakeholder feedback table at Attachment 5.

ISSUES

7. Following approval by the Under Treasurer, an updated MoU based on the Queensland stakeholder feedback was submitted to the Shanghai Foreign Affairs Office for its review and renewal process. The attached draft MoU incorporates the amendments as agreed by both sides (Attachment 1).
8. The main areas of update include:
 - New areas of collaboration in tourism infrastructure investment attraction and regional tourism development, indigenous cultural development and event attraction. ✓
 - An expanded collaboration in agribusiness and food, with a new focus on food product development, agricultural, horticultural and food processing by-product and waste utilisation and the promotion of food safety cooperation and delivery of food safety training programs.
 - Addition of a reciprocal dimension to the Business Executive Training program to provide the opportunity for Queensland executives to undertake this program in Shanghai at their own expense.
 - Addition of a cooperative framework between the Sports and Recreation area of the Department of National Parks, Recreation, Sport and Racing and the Shanghai Sports Bureau to promote collaboration in the fields of swimming, water polo and basketball.
 - Continuation of the annual Public Servant Staff Exchange program in its current form, with its management and the provision of the exchange officers delivered by TIQ and the Shanghai Foreign Affairs Office, on a shared cost basis, in order to maintain the close connection developed to date between the two agencies.
 - Addition of a formal MoU review process at the mid-life point of the MoU through the mechanism of the existing Public Servant Staff Exchange program between TIQ and the Shanghai Foreign Affairs Office.
9. Once approved by you, the Queensland-Shanghai MoU for 2014-2016, will be produced as a formal document in both English and Chinese, in readiness for a joint signing by you with the Shanghai Municipal Government executive during your trip to China later this year.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

10. There is no discrete funding attached to the management of the Queensland-Shanghai MoU. All activities proposed under its auspices are funded by the responsible agencies through their internal budget processes.

RESULTS OF CONSULTATION

11. A list of the Queensland stakeholders consulted during the renewal process is provided at Attachment 4.
12. Mr Zijian Zhang, Trade and Investment Commissioner for Shanghai has managed the consultation process with the Shanghai Foreign Affairs Office to ensure mutual agreement of the updated MoU.



In 1989, Queensland and Shanghai signed a landmark Memorandum of Agreed Cooperation (Memorandum). Through the Memorandum of Agreed Cooperation, Queensland and Shanghai have promoted exchange and mutual understanding in commercial, education, science and technology, cultural, and government sectors. This has resulted in numerous outcomes in the areas of bilateral trade, government and institutional linkages, research and technology exchanges and enhanced cultural relations and mutual appreciation.

Upon reflection of the significance of the Queensland-Shanghai relationship, both Queensland and Shanghai agreed to reconfirm their commitment to furthering the relationship of mutual respect and mutual benefit by signing a 10th Memorandum of Agreed Cooperation for the period 2014-2016.

An Annex to this Memorandum is attached which outlines the general areas of agreed cooperation. With the consent of both sides, this Memorandum and its Annex may be revised and supplemented.


This Memorandum shall not create a legal relationship between the parties, however the parties recognise that projects may be developed that necessitate the signing of a separate legally binding agreement.



ANNEX TO MEMORANDUM OF AGREED COOPERATION 2014 – 2016

1 SUSTAINABLE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

1.1 AGRIBUSINESS AND FOOD

Both sides agree to discuss opportunities for collaboration and information exchange in food and agribusiness, including trade, investment, research, technology development, training and other services. Areas of discussion and potential collaboration may include (but not limited to):

- aquaculture industry development;
- food product development utilising seafood, horticultural crops, sugar cane, meat and grains;
- sensory and consumer analysis for the development of market opportunities;
- agricultural, horticultural and food processing by-product and waste utilisation;
- food quality and shelf life enhancement using natural preservation technologies;
- promotion of food safety cooperation and explore the delivery of food safety training programs;
- further development of technology cooperation in the animal husbandry industry.

1.2 ENERGY EFFICIENCY

Both sides agree to discuss opportunities to share knowledge and experience in clean energy technologies, energy saving technologies and renewable energy projects.

1.3 SUSTAINABLE URBAN DEVELOPMENT

Both sides agree to progress cooperation in sustainable urban development, covering green building and design, environmental management and creative industries under the legal framework developed by Chinese commercial and construction authorities. Areas of discussion and cooperation may include but not be limited to:

- energy efficient green building technologies, sustainable materials production;
- architectural services and landscape design;
- theme park and stadia development;
- environmental regulations and policies;
- environmental planning, designing and consulting;
- creative industries, such as public art and amenities.

1.4 INFORMATION COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY AND DIGITAL ECONOMY

Both sides encourage collaboration in the areas of emergency response, broadband enabled applications for government and industry, aviation systems, sensing technology for agriculture and bio-security.

1.5 TOURISM

1.5.1 Direct Air Services between Queensland and Shanghai

Both sides encourage the establishment of new direct air services or increase existing flights between Queensland airports such as Brisbane, Cairns, the Gold Coast and Shanghai.

1.5.2 Tourism Investment

Both sides agree to establish appropriate connections between suitable organisations in Queensland and Shanghai to foster investment for the development of tourism infrastructure, in particular, regional tourism development.

1.5.3 Tourism Development

Both sides agree to establish appropriate connections between suitable organisations in Queensland and Shanghai with the view to increasing tourism between Shanghai and Queensland by cooperating in:

- tourism development (including regional and Indigenous cultural tourism development) and
- event attraction and management (including the meetings, Incentives, Conferences and Exhibition (MICE Sector))

1.6 BUSINESS EXECUTIVE TRAINING EXCHANGE PROGRAM

Both sides agree to support the training of executives from Shanghai state-owned enterprises in Queensland and Queensland executives in Shanghai, in selected industry sectors agreed to by both sides on a mutually beneficial basis, with all costs met by the participating companies.

2 SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

Both sides agree to support exchange and explore joint research and industry opportunities in science and technology between universities and research institutes in Queensland and Shanghai in mutual interest areas such as biopharmaceutical, nanotechnology, environmental protection and sustainable development.

3 EDUCATION

Queensland and Shanghai recognise the importance of education and training in the relationship between our two states. The linkages built between the two peoples have been strongly supported by both governments. Both parties will continue to identify areas for cooperation on a mutually beneficial basis including the following.

3.1 EDUCATION SYSTEM AWARENESS AND RECOGNITION

Both sides encourage the sharing of information relating to each education and training system with a view to enhance the understanding of each education system through:

3.1.1 Institutional Partnership and Co-Operation

Both sides encourage educational organisations to implement joint delivery or other forms of cooperative programs.

3.1.2 Teacher, Student and Administrator Exchange

Teacher, student and administrator exchanges and reciprocal visits will be enhanced in order to develop improved awareness and understanding of each country's education and training systems. Both sides agree to encourage and facilitate measures to enhance the educational experience of international students in each country.

3.2 KEY SECTORS AND INITIATIVES

3.2.1 VOCATIONAL SECTOR

Both sides agree to promote exchange in the vocational sector through reciprocal visits, teacher development and exchange programs, and cooperation between VET institutions.

3.2.2 HIGHER EDUCATION SECTOR

Both sides will encourage academic linkages between universities and scientific research institutions in Queensland and Shanghai in mutually interested areas including but not limited to aviation, biotechnology, and engineering.

3.2.3 SCHOOL SECTOR

Both sides encourage exchanges and reciprocal visits between schools, teachers and students in Queensland and Shanghai; Shanghai Municipal Education Commission will continue to invite Queensland students to participate in the Shanghai International Sister City Youth Summer Camp.

4 CULTURE AND SPORT

4.1 CULTURAL EXCHANGES

Both sides agree to foster collaborations which encourage knowledge sharing, professional development and exchange programs in the areas of arts, culture (including Indigenous culture), live performance and international film festivals between the Queensland and Shanghai arts industries.

The Queensland Art Gallery will continue to develop strong visual arts programs that feature the historical and contemporary arts of China, the latter developed through

research and exhibitions at the Asia Pacific Triennial of Contemporary Art. The Queensland Art Gallery will also maintain discussions with the Shanghai Art Museum with a view to identifying projects of mutual interest and benefit.

The Queensland Performing Arts Centre and the Shanghai Grand Theatre will explore opportunities for future cooperation.

The State Library of Queensland and the Shanghai Library and Institute of Scientific and Technical Information will maintain and develop exchange and cooperation through the 'Windows of Shanghai' book exchange program, reciprocal contribution to library forums and collaborative exhibition projects.

4.2 SPORT EXCHANGES

Both sides agree to strengthen the mutual understanding and support the establishment of an agreement on sports cooperation between Queensland and Shanghai to enhance exchange and collaboration in sports.

5. GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

5.1 SENIOR GOVERNMENT DELEGATIONS

Queensland and Shanghai welcome reciprocal visits by high level government delegations to further the relationship between both sides.

5.2 QUEENSLAND AND SHANGHAI PARLIAMENTARY EXCHANGES

Both sides agree to continue to promote the bilateral understanding between the Queensland Parliament, the Standing Committee of Shanghai People's Congress and the Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference (CPPCC) Shanghai Committee through bilateral delegation visits and professional exchanges.

5.3 PUBLIC SERVANT STAFF EXCHANGES

Trade and Investment Queensland and the Shanghai Municipal Foreign Affairs Office agree to continue to conduct an annual public servant exchange program to advance mutual understanding and cooperative links. These exchanges will promote and underpin the various initiatives described in this Annex while also seeking to identify and develop new areas of cooperation. Costs are shared between Trade and Investment Queensland and the Shanghai Municipal Foreign Affairs Office.

5.4 MID TERM MOU REVIEW

Both sides agree to implement a MOU review process of existing collaborations and to prepare for renewal at the mid-point of the MoU life. This would be enacted between Trade and Investment Queensland and Shanghai Municipal Foreign Affairs Office.

6. LAW AND JUSTICE

6.1 Judge Exchanges

Both sides agree to promote further understanding and cooperation between legal communities in each other's jurisdiction. Visits by Judges, particularly in the areas of commercial, company, contract and taxation law, will be encouraged.

6.2 Law Court Exchanges

Both sides agree to continue to support the exchange of information and to share knowledge gained through legal experiences within their respective jurisdictions, and encourage reciprocal visits and exchanges.

6.3 Police Training

Both sides agree to promote knowledge exchange, practices and professional development in their police services, so as to combine the Queensland Police Service's expertise in strategic management with Shanghai Public Security Bureau's successful experience in modern police system development to strengthen mutual exchange in the area of police training.

Both sides also agree to explore cooperation in police support systems in areas such as operational, technical and forensic services.

7. WOMEN'S ACTIVITIES

Both sides will continue to encourage exchange and cooperation by delegations of women in senior positions in the areas of government, banking, business, education, health, culture and sport. These exchanges will encourage the discussion of women's rights, roles, and responsibilities. In addition, they will promote activities between women's organisations within Queensland and Shanghai.





ANNEX TO MEMORANDUM OF AGREED COOPERATION 2011 – 2013

1 SUSTAINABLE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

1.1 AGRIBUSINESS AND FOOD

Both sides agree to discuss opportunities for collaboration and information exchange in food and agribusiness, including trade, research, technology development, training and other services.

1.2 ENERGY

Both sides agree to discuss opportunities to share knowledge and experience and explore commercial opportunities in clean coal, renewable energy and energy saving. Areas of discussion may include (but not limited to):

- clean energy technologies;
- emission reduction technologies;
- energy saving projects and technologies;
- smart grid;
- clean energy projects and technologies incorporating the comprehensive utilisation of energy resources.

1.3 GREEN BUILDING AND ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT

Both sides agree to discuss opportunities to progress cooperation in sustainable city development, environmental management and green building. Areas of discussion may include (but not limited to):

- energy saving and zero emission green buildings;
- green building technologies and materials, and evaluation of the standard of green building design;
- landscape design;
- theme park development and related environmental protection;
- environmental planning, designing and consulting;
- environment regulations and policies;
- water treatment technologies;
- low carbon development;
- rural environmental protection;
- training and exchange of human resources related to the above mentioned sectors.

1.4 CREATIVE INDUSTRIES, INFORMATION COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY AND DIGITAL ECONOMY

Both sides agree to explore and develop areas of collaboration within creative industries including architectural design and fashion, as well as the joint promotion of creative industries exhibitions and relating human resources exchange and training in both Queensland and Shanghai.

Both sides encourage collaboration in the areas of e-security; digital content and navigation technologies.

1.5 TOURISM

1.5.1 Direct Air Services between Queensland and Shanghai

Both sides encourage the establishment of direct air services between Queensland airports such as Brisbane, Cairns, the Gold Coast and Shanghai.

1.5.2 Tourism Management

Both sides agree to establish appropriate connections between suitable organisations in Queensland and Shanghai with the view to potentially cooperating in:

- event management;
- tourism development; and
- tourism management.

1.6 BUSINESS EXECUTIVE TRAINING

Both sides agree to support business executive training. Trade Queensland and the Shanghai Economic Management College will jointly support the training of executives from Shanghai state-owned enterprises in Queensland in selected industry sectors agreed to by both sides on a mutually beneficial basis.

2 SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

Both sides agree to support exchange and explore joint research and industry opportunities in science and technology between universities and research institutes in Queensland and Shanghai in mutual interest areas such as biopharmaceutical, nanotechnology, environmental protection and sustainable development.

3 EDUCATION

Queensland and Shanghai recognise the importance of education and training in the relationship between our two states. The linkages built between the two peoples have been strongly supported by both governments. Both parties will continue to identify areas for cooperation on a mutually beneficial basis including the following.

3.1 EDUCATION SYSTEM AWARENESS AND RECOGNITION

Both sides encourage the sharing of information relating to each education and training system with a view to enhance the understanding of each education system through:

3.1.1 Institutional Partnership and Co-Operation

Both sides will identify educational organisations which are able to implement joint delivery or other forms of cooperative programs on a commercially viable basis with benefits to both parties.

3.1.2 Student Mobility and Exchange Program

Both sides will facilitate and encourage student exchanges through forms of study tours with a view to increase awareness of cultural difference.

3.1.3 Teachers and Administrator Exchange

Teacher and administrator exchanges will be encouraged in order to develop improved awareness and understanding of each country's education and training systems.

3.1.4 Enhancing the Educational Experience of International Students

Both sides agree to encourage and facilitate strategies and measures to enhance the educational experience of international students in each country.

3.2 KEY SECTORS AND INITIATIVES

3.2.1 SCHOOL SECTOR

Both sides will conduct a range of mutually-beneficial education activities including Student Study Tours, Shanghai and Queensland Cup Competitions (but not limited to language competitions) and students, teachers and administrators exchange.

3.2.2 VOCATIONAL SECTOR

Both sides agree to promote exchange in the vocational sector through reciprocal visits, teacher development and exchange programs, and cooperation between VET institutions.

3.2.3 HIGHER EDUCATION SECTOR

Both sides will encourage academic linkages between universities and scientific research institutions in Queensland and Shanghai in mutually interested areas including but not limited to aviation, biotechnology, and engineering.

4 HEALTH

4.1 HEALTH SERVICES MANAGEMENT TRAINING

Both sides agree to promote collaborations between Queensland Health and the Shanghai Health Bureau, in areas such as:

- chronic disease prevention;
- communicable diseases;
- hospital management;
- women and children health;
- disease control and prevention related training;
- emergency health and disaster management;
- climate change adaptation and public health system strengthening; and
- e-health, telemedicine, simulation and digital medical imagery.

4.2 HEALTHY CITIES EXCHANGE AND COMMUNITIES PROGRAM

Both sides agree to support Queensland organisations and the Shanghai Health Promotion Committee to establish cooperative relations to build healthy cities and communities, including the exchange of professional technology and information, bilateral visits and joint professional training and workshops.

5 CULTURE AND SPORT

5.1 CULTURAL EXCHANGES

Both sides agree to foster collaborations which encourage knowledge sharing, professional development and exchange programs in the areas of arts, culture and international film festivals between the Queensland and Shanghai arts industries.

The Queensland Art Gallery will continue to develop strong visual arts programs that feature the historical and contemporary arts of China, the latter developed through research and exhibitions at the Asia Pacific Triennial of Contemporary Art. The Queensland Art Gallery will also maintain discussions with the Shanghai Art Museum with a view to identifying projects of mutual interest and benefit.

The State Library of Queensland and the Shanghai Library and Institute of Scientific and Technical Information will maintain and develop exchange and cooperation through the 'Windows of Shanghai' book exchange program, reciprocal contribution to library forums and collaborative exhibition projects.

5.2 SPORT EXCHANGES

Both sides recognise that the linkage between Queensland and Shanghai in the sports sector will be beneficial to the improvement of both cities' sports capability, and agree to pursue exchange and collaboration in sports to promote the development of the sports industry in both cities.

6. GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

6.1 SENIOR GOVERNMENT DELEGATIONS

Queensland and Shanghai welcome reciprocal visits by high level government delegations to further the relationship between both sides.

6.2 QUEENSLAND AND SHANGHAI PARLIAMENTARY EXCHANGES

Both sides agree to continue to promote the bilateral understanding between the Queensland Parliament, the Standing Committee of Shanghai People's Congress and the Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference (CPPCC) Shanghai Committee through bilateral delegation visits and professional exchanges.

6.3 PUBLIC SERVANT STAFF EXCHANGES

Trade Queensland and the Shanghai Municipal Foreign Affairs Office agree to continue to conduct a public servant exchange program to advance mutual understanding and cooperative links. These exchanges will promote and underpin the various initiatives described in this Annex while also seeking to identify and develop new areas of cooperation.

6.4 LAW AND JUSTICE

6.4.1 Judge Exchanges

Both sides agree to promote further understanding and cooperation between legal communities in each other's jurisdiction. Visits by Judges, particularly in the areas of commercial, company, contract and taxation law, will be encouraged.

6.4.2 Law Court Exchanges

Both sides agree to continue to support the exchange of information and to share knowledge gained through legal experiences within their respective jurisdictions. Reciprocal visits and participation in events such as the Asia Pacific Courts Conference will be encouraged.

6.4.3 Police Training

Both sides agree to promote knowledge exchange and professional development in their police services, so as to combine the Queensland Police Service's expertise in strategic management with Shanghai Public Security Bureau's successful experience in modern police system development to strengthen mutual exchange in the area of police training.

Both sides also agree to explore cooperation in police support systems in areas such as operational, technical and forensic services.

6.5 WOMEN'S ACTIVITIES

Both sides will continue to encourage exchange and cooperation by delegations of women in senior positions in the areas of government, banking, business, education, health, culture and sport. These exchanges will encourage the discussion of women's rights, roles, and responsibilities. In addition, they will promote activities between women's organisations within Queensland and Shanghai.

The Queensland Government and program sponsors meet the tuition, airfares and homestay accommodation. China has been sending between six and 13 students per year. – Shanghai Cup (2011): The Shanghai Cup is a Chinese language competition held in Queensland, Australia and open to Queensland students. Commencing in 2005, four Queensland winners are awarded up to two weeks tuition in a Shanghai school, with tuition and accommodation only being met by the Shanghai Municipal Education Commission (SMEC). All airfare costs are met by the Queensland Government. <p>The main purpose of the above events is to further promote the friendship and good relationships between Queensland and Shanghai, and to increase the awareness of the State of Queensland and its education system. These events normally occur on an alternating biennial basis, with the 2010 Queensland Cup having been followed by the 2011 Shanghai Cup. HIGH LEVEL VISITS

Queensland to Shanghai

- The Hon. Tim Nichols, Treasurer and Trade Minister visited Shanghai and Beijing in July 2012 on his first visit to China as Trade Minister, to promote trade and investment opportunities.
- The Hon. Andrew Fraser, former Treasurer and Minister for Employment, Economic Development and Trade officiated at the Queensland Week in Shanghai events during the Shanghai World Expo in June 2010.
- Hon Stephen Robertson, former Minister for Natural Resources, Mines and Energy visited Shanghai in October 2010.
- Mr Rod Camm, Associate Director General, Department of Education and Training, (visiting on behalf of the Minister) in July 2010.

Shanghai to Queensland

- HE Yang Xiong, Executive Vice Mayor of Shanghai visited Queensland in November 2010 to officially thank the State for its support and participation in the Shanghai World Expo.
- Mr Lu, Vice Chair, Science and Technology Commission of Shanghai Municipality led a delegation to Queensland to discuss potential joint science and technology opportunities in April 2012.
- Mr Guo Jian, Deputy Director-General, General Office, Shanghai Municipal People's Government led a small delegation to Queensland in November 2012.
- Mr Gao Qizhong, Director, Shanghai Economic Management College and delegation visited in November 2012 to thank Queensland for its participation in the Business Executive Training program 2012, a collaborative program held under the Queensland-Shanghai MoU for the past four years.
- Ms Yao Jun, Chairperson, Shanghai Putuo District Women's Federation and delegation from Shanghai Women's Federation in November 2011.
- Ms Shi Qiuqin, Counsellor of Shanghai Women's Federation and delegation in November 2010.

COLLABORATIVE ACTIVITIES AND OUTCOMES

Arts and Culture

Queensland Art Gallery

- The Queensland Art Gallery and the Shanghai Museum share a well established cooperation. This relationship was cemented in 2006 when the Queensland Art Gallery undertook a three year loans program with the Shanghai Museum bringing to Queensland audiences a large collection of significant historical Chinese objects.
- The Queensland Art Gallery's signature exhibition project, the Asia Pacific Triennial of Contemporary Art consistently showcases Chinese contemporary art. The APT commenced in 1993 and since that time more than 1.8 million people have visited the exhibitions. 'The 6th Asia Pacific Triennial of Contemporary Art' (APT6) was held from 5 December 2009 to 5 April 2010 and attracted over 500,000 attendees.
- For APT7, which opened in December 2012, two Shanghai-based artists and artist groups, Zhou Tiehai and MadIn Company, participated with providing major works in the exhibition.

State Library of Queensland

- The State Library of Queensland holds a longstanding Memorandum of Exchange and Cooperation with the Shanghai Library. For the past two years under its auspices the following activities have been undertaken:

- Book donation - Exchange of 50 books a year between the State Library of Queensland and Shanghai Library under the Windows of Shanghai book exchange program.
- The Light from Light exhibition, a simultaneous solar powered media exhibition staged by Shanghai Library and Queensland State Library.

Queensland Performing Arts Centre (QPAC)

- QPAC has a strong focus on expanding its relationship and exchanges with China. The QPAC CEO has undertaken two recent trips to China with a view to progressing relationships in a number of cities, including Shanghai. At this stage, while there are no definite plans, discussions are ongoing with the Shanghai Grand Theatre for future cooperation.

Business Executive Training Program

- The Business Executive Training program is a cooperative training program delivered between Queensland and Shanghai, at no cost to the Queensland Government, where Queensland companies deliver training programs to rising Chinese business executives from a complementary industry sector for an eight week period.
- Held successfully for the past four years, the program promotes international cooperation in a business setting and the connections if maintained over time have the potential to bring substantial benefits to the Queensland host company through increase trade and investment opportunities.
- The inaugural Queensland participant in the program was Rydges South Bank Hotel which hosted executives from leading Shanghai hotelier, Jinjiang Group in 2009.
- This was followed by Food Spectrum hosting two executives from China's second largest food conglomerate, Bright Food Group, who have continued to work together since this time on Food Spectrum's China market develop strategy.
- In 2011, Queensland's largest power generator, Stanwell Corporation, delivered a customised training program to two executives from Shanghai's Shenergy Group, a key State-owned enterprise.
- In 2012, Birkdale International hosted two executives from Shanghai Gardening Group and Transpacific International hosted an executive from the Shanghai Solid Waste Disposal Centre. In based cases a strong business relationship has been forged with ongoing collaboration between the firms.

Education and Training

- The Department of Education, Training and Employment (DETE) shares a longstanding MoU on education cooperation with the Shanghai Municipal Education Commission, first signed in 1989. The current MoU commenced on 1 January 2011 and expires on 31 December 2013. It provides the framework for the joint collaborations between the two agencies. Examples of these collaborations include:
 - 2010 Shanghai World Expo: Two VIP events were delivered relevant to the education sector within the Australian Pavilion at the Shanghai World Expo in 2010. The first event was targeted at educational institutions and Queensland alumni in Shanghai, and also involved the presentation ceremony of the Queensland Cup (an English language competition). The second event involved the presentation of new awards, developed by Trade and Investment Queensland (TIQ) for outstanding institutional linkages between Shanghai and Queensland. The activities had three key outcomes: strengthened the existing educational linkages between Shanghai and Queensland; promoted Queensland as a quality education destination; and demonstrated a strong commitment to Shanghai region.
 - Queensland Cup (2010): The Queensland Cup is an English language competition held in Shanghai, China and open to Chinese students. The competition was initiated by the TIQ Shanghai office and has run since 2001. Winners are awarded up to two weeks' tuition in a Queensland institution. The Queensland Government and program sponsors meet the tuition, airfares and homestay accommodation. China has been sending between six and 13 students per year.

- Shanghai Cup (2011): The Shanghai Cup is a Chinese language competition held in Queensland and open to all Queensland students. Commencing in 2005, four Queensland winners are awarded up to two weeks tuition in a Shanghai school, with tuition and accommodation met by the Shanghai Municipal Education Commission. All airfare costs are met by the Queensland Government.
- The main purpose of the above events is to further promote the friendship and the strong relationship between Queensland and Shanghai, and to increase the awareness of the State of Queensland and its education system. These events normally occur on an alternating biennial basis, with the 2010 Queensland Cup followed by the 2011 Shanghai Cup. Both events are currently on hold for the remainder of the Education MoU and will be reconsidered in the next iteration of the MoU on the basis of agreement reached by DETE with the Shanghai Municipal Education Commission on an equitable cost-sharing of the activities.
- Shanghai – Queensland Guest Teacher Program (2010 and 2011): A reciprocal teacher exchange program occurred in 2010 which was intended to place four teachers from both countries in the host country for one school term each. Four Queensland teachers participated in this exchange. However, Shanghai advised that only one teacher could participate in term one.
- Queensland-Shanghai Student Exchange (2010, 2011 and 2012): Queensland students attend the annual Shanghai Sister Cities Youth Camp, joining other students from most of the other sister cities of Shanghai. Six Queensland students and one Queensland teacher chaperone are invited to attend the camp, which runs for approximately two weeks. Under the terms of the Education MoU the Shanghai Government meets all in-country costs, with the Queensland Government meeting all international travel and other costs. Outcomes from this project include: enabling Queensland students to build relationships with students from different countries through shared interests, sharing of knowledge with students and teachers from other countries, developing an understanding of the different ways in which students learn from other cultures and developing leadership skills in both students and teachers.
- Shanghai-Queensland Student Exchange (2011): In reciprocation, Queensland hosts six Shanghai students and one Shanghai teacher chaperone for approximately two weeks. Under the terms of the Education MoU, the Queensland Government meets all in-country costs, with the Shanghai Government meeting all international travel and other costs.
- The International Education and Training Unit was established in TIQ in 2011 to lead the Queensland Government's export promotion of Queensland's education and training industry. In collaboration with the TIQ Shanghai Office, the IETU has developed a strong relationship with the Shanghai Municipal Education Commission. The IETU (in its former incarnation as Queensland Education and Training Unit) and TIQ Shanghai have supported the Queensland Cup event in Shanghai for the past six years.
- An IETU-funded Business Development Manager for Education based in the TIQ Shanghai office have attended and supported SMEC's key events, such as sister cities summer camp in 2011 and 2012. The officer also assisted with the with an independent schools mission in June 2012 which comprised ten representatives from Queensland independent schools. The mission included a workshop and meetings with 20 education agents in Shanghai.

Food and Agribusiness

- The Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry has advised it is working in close partnership with a commercial licensee on a sugar cane product that has significant potential in China, including Shanghai.
- During Queensland Week in Shanghai at the Shanghai Word Expo in June 2010, the Food and Agribusiness Unit, Trade and Investment Queensland (TIQ) funded a Queensland Ambassador Chef, David Pugh to attend the Expo where he profiled a range of Queensland fresh food products including beef and seafood in cooking demonstrations. He also designed the menu for various networking events hosted by the Queensland Government at the Australian Pavilion.

Green Building / Sustainable Urban Development

- Shanghai offers significant opportunities in the green building/sustainable urban development sector. A number of Queensland design firms have set up offices in Shanghai to actively pursue opportunities in landscaping design, residential and sporting developments and aged care facilities. TIQ has worked closely with these firms and other Queensland companies to promote Queensland's in this sector.
- The Creative Industries unit in the former Department of Employment, Economic Development and Innovation under a number of projects to assist Queensland firms to connect with Shanghai developers, government regulators, architectural and urban planning partners. These included:
 - Staged two business missions for Queensland architectural and design businesses to Shanghai in June 2010 and during 2011 to promote Queensland's sustainable tropical and subtropical environmental architectural expertise.
 - Hosted a business seminar in Shanghai in June 2011 in conjunction with the Shanghai Real Estate Trade Association. The event promoted collaboration between Queensland and Shanghai architects in sustainable environmental architectural design to an audience of 70 Shanghai Government and private developers. This resulted in a Queensland firm winning a design contract for a new school in Jiading, Shanghai.
 - Provided on-the-ground assistance in Shanghai/China with a Queensland Government subcontracted officer for business development in China.

Healthy Cities and Communities

- 2008 Queensland Health transferred leadership of the MoU's Healthy Cities Exchange and Communities Program to Griffith University which signed its own MoU on Healthy Cities with the Shanghai Municipal Health Promotion Committee in 2008.
- During 2010-2012 the partnership between Griffith University and the Shanghai Municipal Health Promotion Committee has focussed on four areas of strategic importance: healthy cities, public health leadership, occupational health and safety management and climate change and health. Shanghai has become a shining example of a Mega Healthy City, well regarded by the World Health Organisation. Under the leadership of the Shanghai Municipal Health Promotion Committee, the healthy cities project has far reaching impacts and has now expanded beyond the overall Municipality to the development of healthy townships. Griffith University will continue to facilitate this next phase by providing professional capacity building activities from short term training to other advisory functions. Highlights from the collaboration are as follows:
 - Healthy Cities Collaboration: Mutual visits and exchange of information; Capacity building activities—professional short courses for the 18 Districts representatives from the Shanghai Health Promotion Committee hosted by Griffith University funded by the Shanghai Municipal Government; Mutual conference invitation and attendance.
 - Public Health Leadership and Management Professional Development: Provision of one fellowship per year since 2008 to the Shanghai Centre for Disease Control and Prevention in public health leadership and management professional development program hosted by Griffith University sponsored by the AusAID Leadership Award Fellowship.
 - Occupation Health and Safety Management:
 - Capacity building and facilitation of research projects supported by the Australian Endeavour Executive Award.
 - Attendance by occupational health expert from the Shanghai Minhang District Occupational Health Expert to the International Forum on Promoting Health at work hosted by Griffith University sponsored by the Australia-China Foundation.
 - Joint project on "Analysis of effects on using empowerment strategies to decrease occupational hazards among migrant worker" funded by the Natural Science Foundation of Minhang District.

Science and Technology

- In the science and technology area, a successful Queensland-Shanghai Science and Innovation Forum was held during the Shanghai World Expo in June 2010. A delegation of 20 senior scientists and researchers led by former Queensland Chief Scientist attended in joint participation with the Science and Technology Commission of Shanghai Municipality.
- The forum forged collaborative research partnerships through the signing of three collaboration agreements between University of Queensland, Queensland University of Technology, Griffith University with their Chinese partners in Shanghai and led to the submission of 13 joint applications to the Science and Technology Commission of Shanghai Municipality.
- Out of this, two joint Queensland-Shanghai scientific and medical research projects are underway following successful joint research applications submitted to the Science and Technology Commission of Shanghai. One is focussed on neurological illnesses, conducted by the Queensland Brain Institute at the University of Queensland and the Shanghai Second Military Medical University and the other on novel wound treatment processes utilising Chinese Traditional Medicines, conducted by Queensland University of Technology and the Shanghai Second Military Medical University.
- In 2011, the former Assistant Director-General of the former Department of Employment Economic Development and Innovation visited Shanghai and met with Vice Chairman Xu, Science and Technology Commission of Shanghai Municipality to affirm the Queensland Government support for science and innovation collaborations between Queensland and Shanghai.
- In April 2012, the Queensland Government hosted a high-level delegation from the Science and Technology Commission of Shanghai Municipality, led by Vice-Chairman Lu, to discuss potential science and innovation opportunities. An outcome of this meeting was a commitment from both parties to support the next Queensland-Shanghai Science and Innovation Forum, proposed to be held in 2013.
- In October 2012, the Department of Science, Information Technology, Innovation and the Arts hosted a delegation from the Science and Technology Development and Exchange Center. The meeting provided an opportunity to explore cooperation between the parties in technology transfer and science and technology projects, as well sharing strategies and activities in S&T skills development and attraction.

Police Services Training

- This is an active area where the Queensland Police Service provides a range of training courses to the Shanghai Municipal Public Security Bureau and the Shanghai Police College, including Introductory Policing in Queensland, technical expertise exchanges and strategic management and leadership courses. A strong relationship has been established between the Queensland Police Service Academy (QPSA) and the Shanghai Municipal Public Security Bureau (SMPSB) with a number of cooperative activities implemented during the past two years includes:
 - The QPSA conducted 9 three-week Strategic Management leadership courses which were attended by 48 senior SMPSB officers.
 - The QPSA also conducted a three-week introductory Policing in Queensland course for 20 Shanghai Police recruits in May 2012. The Shanghai Police College seeks to undertake the program again in the future with Queensland.
 - Technical Expertise Exchange – in 2010, the QPSA funded a former Chief Superintendent to attend the SMPSB and lecture on the capabilities and expertise of the QPS in investigations. This visit contributed to enhancing the relationship shared by QPSA and SMPSB.
 - Outbound delegation visit: in 2010, the QPSA funded three members of the QPS senior management to attend various Chinese jurisdictions with the purpose of enhancing existing relationships, in particular, with SMPSB. The visit strengthened Queensland's relationship with SMPSB.

Public Servant Staff Exchange

- The Public Servant Staff Exchange Program is an annual exchange program held since 2009 between TIQ and the Shanghai Foreign Affairs Office. Each year one officer is hosted by the counterparty jurisdiction for an eight week period.
- So far three officers from Shanghai and two from Queensland have undergone this exchange program. The connections forged between the exchange officer and host organisation helps to retain the close connection between Shanghai and Queensland to promote closer understanding and cooperation between the two Governments.

Sport and Recreation

- The area of sports collaboration saw a new formal cooperation established between the Shanghai International Marathon and Gold Coast Events Management Ltd to collaborate in the promotion of the annual Shanghai International Marathon and Gold Coast Airport Marathon. This was formalised in a MOU signing by the two entities on 4 December 2011. TIQ Shanghai office provided support towards the advancement of this agreement.
- Sport and Recreation Services in the Department of National Parks, Recreation, Sport and Racing has agreed to work with the Shanghai Sports Bureau to promote a framework for mutual collaboration in the sports area with a specific focus on swimming, water polo and basketball.

Tourism

- The Hon Jann Stuckey, Minister for Tourism, Major Events, Small Business and the Commonwealth Games led a tourism investment focused mission to China and Hong Kong in July 2012. The Minister joined with the Hon Tim Nicholls, Treasurer and Trade Minister for his meeting with the Executive Vice-Mayor of Shanghai, Mr He Yang Xiong on 20 July 2012.
- During the mission, the Treasurer and Trade Minister and the Tourism Minister signed a letter of intent with China Eastern Airlines to institute a direct Shanghai-Cairns flight. On 31 October 2012 the service commenced, marking the first direct flight to Shanghai from Queensland and providing a significant boost to the Cairn's region's economy.

Women's Activities

- TIQ and Office of Women staff hosted two delegations from the Shanghai Women's Federation during their consecutive visits to Queensland in 2010 and 2011. The Office of Women representatives shared information on key government initiatives impacting on women including domestic and family violence prevention; women's leadership and women's participation in non-traditional industries.
- In 2012, the Vice President of Shanghai Womens Federation, Mandam Li Rong, hosted a lunch for the Queensland public servant undertaking the Public Servant Staff Exchange in Shanghai. At the lunch it was agreed TIQ would continue to maintain close cooperation with the Shanghai Women's Federation to promote leadership and training opportunities for SWF members at Queensland institutes and to explore the opportunity for exchanges for women in business.
